#### U3A (UWA) Perth Seminar: The Genius of DNA

The annual seminar run by Perth U3A was held on Saturday 13 July in the Wesley Centre in the city. Entitled *The Genius of DNA*, it brought together a dazzling array of speakers on a topic of interest to all. Included were Dr Gavin Turbitt from Pathology West, Dr Ruey Leng Loo from The International Phenome Centre, Christine Harris from the Family Centre of WA, Professor Robert Mead and Dr Shane Tobe both from Murdoch University.

Gavin Turbitt was comprehensive and interesting on the history of DNA sequencing with plenty of humorous anecdotes and a bit of black humour.

Shane Tobe provided some fascinating case histories around the use of DNA in



tracing the trafficking of endangered species by testing of animal and plant products.

Ruey Leng Loo made the case for the importance of pee and poo which she loves to analyse for all the information it provides about our health and immune system across cultures and continents.

Christine Harris provided lots of detail, including pitfalls when delving into family DNA. In particular she warned about the unintended consequences of turning up family history that some may prefer not to be disclosed.

Robert Mead had the dreaded last spot on the program but had us all riveted with his documentary of a 29-year-old case where DNA unmasked a serial killer.

Altogether a great day. Congratulations to the committee, Stephanie Mitchell, Jennie Cox and Ron Mitchell and the members of Wanneroo U3A who assisted with the organisation.

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## **NEW SOUTH WALES**

#### 2019 U3A Network NSW Conference: Defy Expectation

Hats off to Tamworth! The 2019 conference hosted by Tamworth Regional U3A, 10-12 April 2019, attracted 110 registrants representing 39 U3As (including Alice Springs).

Cowboy hats were provided to all attendees by Barry Harley, Tamworth Regional Council (country music and events), a reminder of Tamworth's other big event, the famous Country Music Festival.



The principal keynote speaker was Age Discrimination Commissioner, the Hon. Dr Kay Patterson AO, who spoke of the importance of finding ways to change attitudes towards senior members of the community. There were important presentations on governance, copyright and trademark by Network governance officer Carmen Champion, along with valuable workshops covering topics encompassing resources for courses, finding committee members, legalities of associations and raising the profile of your U3A, to name a few.

#### **Network Committee changes**

Allan Haggarty retired from the committee, having served in several positions, including president (2012-2015), vice-president and regional representative, since 2010. Allan was presented with a commemorative plaque at the AGM in appreciation of his service to the Network and his outstanding dedication to the greater U3A movement.

Beverley Peken has retired having served first as metropolitan representative (as president of Sydney U3A) and later as vice-president, over the past 6 years. Along with her predecessor Barbara Caldicott, Beverley brought Sydney U3A into the Network in 2010. Rowena Simone retired as secretary, after 3 years in this pivotal position. Robert Birrer is the new secretary.

Ian Robertson, re-elected as Network president at the AGM in April, resigned in June from the committee due to personal family circumstances, although he will continue to work with the committee on special projects. Laurene Mulcahy has stepped up from vice to president.

## **SOUTH AUSTRALIA**

Bookings have opened for the Adelaide Hills Rendezvous to be held 22-24 October in and around Hahndorf. Hosted by U3A Adelaide Hills, this is an opportunity for members from across the State to meet and enjoy a wide programme of U3A-related sessions along with local tourism attractions. The selection of over 30 activities, 2 dinners and several cream teas has necessitated an online booking system. SA doesn't hold conferences so U3A Riverland inaugurated this style of gathering in 2017 and it looks like it will become a biennial feature.

U3A SA will be holding its AGM in October and is asking all U3As to do some talent spotting amongst their members. We need interested members to fill vacancies on various subcommittees but most importantly we need a new webmaster. U3A Adelaide's Pauline McCreery has done a tremendous job but changed circumstances mean she now needs to turn it over to someone else. Pauline says it hasn't been very time consuming. It just requires someone with a basic knowledge of WordPress or willingness to learn.

Representatives from all U3As are free to attend the quarterly meetings of our State network. This allows an opportunity for real networking between U3As and one example has been brought to our attention by U3A Yorke Peninsula president Heather Simpson. Back in 2013 the Yorke Peninsula representative said it was difficult to get new subjects started and they might like to try mah-jong but had no one to teach them.

Yorke Peninsula is the central boot-shaped peninsula north/west of Adelaide. It includes the Copper Coast northern region and the Yorke Peninsula southern region. U3AYP does not have its own building in any town. One chooses a topic and travels to the town in which it is offered.

Grant money was made available by the State network for four members from U3A Campbelltown to drive the 160km to run a two-day mah-jong workshop in farming centre

Maitland (pop. 1,000).

Pederson provided the

and, with her helpers, had
28 U3AYP members
understanding the
relevance of this Chinese
game and how it has been
adopted by Western
culture. Some local



members travelled 100km a day. It was an eye opener to city members into just how difficult it is to organise activities in a large, sparsely populated area.

Since that small beginning, mah-jong has spread through many of the peninsula's towns. When another course was offered at Minlaton, many members made the 120 km round trip to increase their opportunity to play. Further beginner courses were offered by U3AYP; playing socially increased, and one member started teaching the game outside of U3AYP. Over time some 30 sets were purchased for personal use outside of U3A.

In 2016 courses were offered in Wallaroo. Next Moonta and Pt Vincent picked up the game with the latter now hosting play weekly. Mah-jong Fests are held every term either in Maitland or Kadina. From the start, contact with Campbelltown has been maintained and greatly valued. Some members from U3AYP have visited U3A Campbelltown and in turn Vale and Marie Galletta visited Kadina to introduce scoring. Vale Pederson has maintained her contribution of expertise and support which has been greatly appreciated. As a result, some 50 out of 150 financial members are attending mah-jong courses on a yearly basis. Let's see more inter-U3A projects and may they all be as successful.

U3A creative writers may be interested in a community radio station PBA FM project. In February, PBA FM launched their first *Well Versed* program. Poets across SA were invited to submit and record their poems for broadcasting and an audiobook anthology. Nearly 70 poets entered their work, which is still being broadcast by PBA FM. *Well Versed 2* will be launched in February 2021 as part of Fringe and Salisbury Fringe. ## **VICTORIA**

As at May 2019, there were 108 U3As in Victoria with a total of more than 39,000 members. Total membership grew by 2.9 per cent in the year.

A pilot Targeted Growth project has been running for a few months in a group of five U3As to encourage higher membership in a corridor with a high proportion of seniors. The five U3A committees were provided with tools to analyse their situation and begin planning for growth. Whilst the project is still underway, it has now been linked with work on inclusiveness to build broader community engagement. Twenty-one U3As are participating in the inclusiveness project.

The Victorian government has established a seniors' participation toolbox which provides case studies and learnings to promote inclusiveness. Following completion of the strategic plan last year, work commenced on a review of the rules of Network Victoria. The review was led by a working group of Network and member U3As. Some of the key issues that were tackled included:

- The ability to register for Deductible Gift Recipient status to seek funding from broader sources, including philanthropic trusts and gifts
- Change to a financial year ending 30 June to facilitate negotiations and reporting to government funding sources
- Introduction of annual terms and conditions which, amongst other things, enable data collection
- Clarify the exercise of voting rights by delegates of member U3As
- A requirement for member U3As to be incorporated in future
- Clarification about the scope and role of members council

It is expected that the rules will be voted on at a special meeting in September.

Network made a recent submission to the Aged Care Royal Commission to advocate the need to strengthen community-based organisations that support seniors for the 15 to 20 years following retirement, and thereby help to manage the high and growing demand for aged care services.

Network has produced a pamphlet listing all U3As in Victoria. It will be distributed shortly to various community organisations and used to promote U3As at the annual seniors' festival.
